Dmitry Kuzmin is a son of literary critic and editor Edwarda Kuzmina and a grandson of the prominent literary translator Nora Gal'. He graduated from the Moscow State Pedagogical University in 1993, then in 2005 got a PhD from Samara State Pedagogical University. He taught poetry and literary translation in some universities including Princeton University in 2014 and co-authored the text-book "Poetry" (2016, the best educational book at Moscow International Book Fair). His book-length study of one-line poetry was also published by the leading Russian humanities publisher Novoye Literaturnoye Obozreniye ("New Literary Review Publishers") in 2016. In 1989 Kuzmin founded the Vavilon Union of Young Poets, which was the organizational hub for Moscow's experimental poetry scene. Since 1993 he is the head of ARGO-RISK Publishers (about 15 titles of present-day Russian poetry yearly). Since 1996 he is editing the Vavilon Internet project (www.vavilon.ru) which includes an anthology of present-day Russian writing (about 200 authors up to the moment). Since 2006 he is also editor in chief of Vozdukh ("Air"), a quarterly poetry magazine. Kuzmin had also run Moscow Literary Life monthly review (1996–2002), the first Russian magazine for young writers Vavilon (1992–2003), the first Russian magazine for gay writing RISK (1996–2002), the first Russian haiku magazine Triton (2000-2004) etc.

**Yuri Leving** is University Research Professor in the Department of Russian Studies, Dalhousie University, Canada. He was an Alexander von Humboldt Senior Research Fellow at Heidelberg University and an affiliated research fellow at the American Academy in Rome. Leving is the author of five monographs and editor of six volumes of articles, most recently *Marketing Literature and Posthumous Legacies* (2013), *Lolita: The Story of a Cover Girl – Vladimir Nabokov's Novel in Art and Design* (2013), and *Anatomy of a Short Story* (2012). Leving has published over a hundred scholarly articles on various aspects of Russian and comparative literature. He served as a commentator on the first authorized Russian edition of *The Collected Works of Vladimir Nabokov's Lolita:* 1955-2005" in Washington, D.C., which celebrated the 50th anniversary of the publication of *Lolita*. Leving is the founding editor of the *Nabokov Online Journal*.

**Wolf Moskovich** is a Professor Emeritus of the Hebrew University in Jerusalem. He has over 300 publications, including several monographs in the fields of theoretical linguistics, Slavic philology and languages of the Jews.
